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

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

INSTRUCTION

- EARIST Manila Campus received 2,637 enrollees in the Graduate Program for Academic Year 2019-2020 where 1,333 or 50.55% were enrolled during the First Semester while 1,304 were listed during the Second Semester. EARIST Cavite Campus on the other hand acknowledged the enrolment of 776 students in the Graduate Program for the same academic year with 375 or 48.32% for the First Semester while 401 or 51.68% for the Second Semester.
- In the Undergraduate Program for EARIST Manila Campus, 24,430 were registered for Academic Year 2019-2020 where 12,474 or 51.06% for the First Semester while 11,956 or 48.94% for the Second Semester. Whereas, EARIST Cavite Campus had 6,761 listed enrollees of which 3,708 or 54.84% for the First Semester and 3,053 or 45.16% for the Second Semester.
- Special Opportunity Program (Manila Campus only) admitted 1,064 students for two academic terms in 2019. For the First Term, January to June, 595 students or 55.92% were enlisted while for the Second term, July to December, 469 students or 44.08% were enrolled.
- The EARIST Graduate School 52nd Commencement Exercises was conducted at the New World Bay Hotel, Manila on April 24, 2019. However, the Undergraduate Program 52nd Commencement Exercises was celebrated at the Philippine International Convention Center, Pasay City on April 27, 2019. EARIST Cavite Campus Commencement Exercises was administered at the EARIST Campus on April 12, 2019.
- In 2019, the Institute took pride with its board examination topnotchers. John Vincent R. Lopez topped the Architecture Licensure Examination held in June 2019. John Patrick A. Privado was Top 2 in the Criminology Licensure Examination held on November 2019. Bherna Jeann R. Urayenza placed Top 1 in the National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM) Exam slated last October 2019. Jomar G. Piñano was Top 2 Student Police Non-Commissioned Officers (PNCO) NCR-Training Course-Public Safety Recruit Course.
- First time takers in the Professional Regulations Commission (PRC) Licensure Examinations did well with five (5) course programs surpassing the National Passing Rate, namely: Architecture Licensure Examinations, Criminology Licensure Examinations (June and November), and Licensure Examination for Teachers (Elementary and Secondary Level).
- A total of one hundred sixty-six (166) Staff Development Memorandum were issued and funded by the Administration in 2019.

- The Institute's scholarship grants were awarded to students-recipients for the ESGPPA with 163 and 156 grantees for the first and second semester respectively in 2019. On the other hand, TES scholarships was also conferred to 24 scholars for both first and second semesters.
- Three course programs of the Institute were visited by the accreditors from the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines, Inc. (AACCUP) from February 25 to March 1. These programs were BS Industrial Technology in the College of Industrial Technology, BS in Hotel and Restaurant Management in the College of Hospitality Management, and BS Mathematics in the College of Arts and Sciences which underwent Level 4, Phase 1 evaluation.
- The Commission on Higher Education – NCR (CHED-NCR) visited the Institute to conduct a monitoring and evaluation designed for Higher Education Institutions headed by Dr. Bellaflor M. Coronado together with Dr. Jessie O. Abril and Ms. Marife P. Flores.
- Richelle Kirk A. Tabanera (Oil/Acrylic Category) and Nicolle T. Plamer (Watercolor Category) won the First Place while Wendi T. Patoc was Second Place in the Sculpture Category in the 52nd Shell National Students Art Competition with the theme "ImagineNation" in Glorietta Mall, Makati City on November 11, 2019.
- Christian Jame Maglente was declared Grand Winner in Water Based Category whereas Wendi T. Patoc was a Runner Up in Oil/Acrylic Category in the Petron Vision National Student Art Competition 2019.
- Joshua Manahan was conferred the Gold Award and Lumen Rose Caacbay garnered a Runner Up plum in the 10th Philippine Culinary Cup held on August 7-10, 2019 in SMX Convention Center, Pasay City.
- The College of Arts and Sciences made use of the non-teaching hours of his faculty to develop an outcomes based teaching and learning (OBTL) syllabi.
- An In-house Faculty Training and Seminar on "Teaching Strategies" and "Data Science and Business Analytics" was initiated by Dr. Sheila Marie M. Matias, Chairperson of the Information and Technology Education Department.
- The College of Industrial Technology conducted in-house seminars entitled "Drafting Technology" and Training in Hytech Power" while the College of Business Administration conducted a seminar entitled "One Heart One CBA".

- The Sports Development and Physical Education Department participated in various competitions, namely: 6th Geraldine Darwin's dance Challenge staged at the Ynares Sports Arena in Pasig City on February 16, 2019; UUAP – Ola Bayle 2019 spotlighted at the University of Santo Tomas-Institute of Physical Education and Athletics Gym on May 3, 2019, 14th Lilian's Cup 2019 was contested at the Meralco MultiPurpose Hall in Pasig City on June 22, 2019, 2019 Philippine Athletics Championship-National Open was held in Ilagan City Sports Complex, Isabela from March 4 to 9, 2019, 2nd Poomsae and Kyorugi Taekwondo Championship was contested in Mambungan Elementary School Gym, Antipolo City on June 1, 2019 where the Senior Category of the FFAI EARIST Taekwondo Team was declared as the Overall Champion.
- Mr. Edzel G. Peña was conferred as a Certified Criminalistics Specialist in Forensic Dactyloscopy by the Philippine Criminalistics Society, Inc. in Baguio City on May 2019.
- The Institute Administration encouraged its faculty and employees in furtherance of their studies with the following graduates: Ms. Emilie T. Rarugal received her Bachelor of Science in Office Administration major in Office Management; Ms. Hazel F. Anuncio concluded her Master in Information Technology degree through CHED K to 12 Scholarship Program from AMA University – QC on May 30, 2019; Adamson University granted Ms. Ruth Lareza A. Morales the Master of Arts in Psychology with Specialization in Developmental/Educational Psychology on June 28, 2019 through the CHED K to 12 Scholarship Program; Mr. Edzel G. Peña (ECC Faculty) received his diploma in MS in Criminal Justice with Specialization in Criminology from Universidad de Manila on April 5, 2019; Ms. Sheila Marie M. Matias graduated with the degree Doctor of Education major in Educational Management in this Institute April 24, 2019; Mr. Jesus S. Paguigan finished his Doctor in Information Technology from AMA University – QC on May 30, 2019; and Mr. Jayson D. Tolentino completed his Doctor of Philosophy in Mathematics degree through CHED K to 12 Scholarship Program from Ateneo de Manila University on June 01, 2019.
- Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA) awarded the NC II and NC III certification in Travel Services and Book Keeping respectively to College of Hospitality Management faculty members.
- The Institute held its 52nd Commencement Exercises with the theme “Empowering Graduates for the Thriving Nation” in the Graduate Program in New World Bay Hotel, Manila on April 24, 2019 while the Undergraduate Program was held at the PICC on April 27, 2019. EARIST Cavite Campus graduation was conducted in the same campus.

- An orientation program was spearheaded by the school officials welcoming the freshmen and transferee students on September 3-4, 2019 where school's mandate, policies, rules and regulations, and other matters were explicated to the participants.
- EARIST student leaders from different school's organizations attended the 3-day 1st Student Leadership Congress with the theme "Strengthening Leadership and Commitment of Student Leaders" on November 15-17, 2019 in Batis Aramin Hotel and Resort, Lucban, Quezon Province.

RESEARCH

- Faculty members from the Institute participated in the 2019 International Higher Education Research Forum (IHERF) themed as "The Future of Higher Education Research for Industry 4.0" hosted by Marikina Polytechnic College (MPC) held on August 27-29, 2019 at the Novotel Hotel, Araneta Center, Cubao, Quezon City.
- The Institute's 12th Research Colloquium, with two (2) presentations – Poster Presentation and Oral Presentation and four (4) topics - Pure and Applied Sciences; Education and Social Sciences; Business, Psychology, and Public Governance; and Technology and Innovation, was presented by the College of Arts and Sciences with the theme "Establishing Collaborative Partnerships towards Productive Research and Innovation" scheduled on the 24th and 25th of October 2019. The Resource Speakers were Dr. Marie Paz E. Morales-Director of the Publication Office of Philippine Normal University, and Dr. Nelson Arboleda Jr.-Director of the DLSU Research Ethics Office. Prizes were conferred to the Top 3 winners for each topic.
- Institute's entries in the 2019 Regional Invention Contest and Exhibit - National Capital Region, dubbed as "Innovations and Inventions for a Sustainable Development" held in Technological Institute of the Philippines – Quezon City on November 6-8, 2019, was acknowledged by the organizing committee.
- Patimpalak sa Agham at Teknolohiya ng EARISTian (PATATE) 2019 with the theme "Reenergizing Innovation Through Industry 4.0 Platform" was conducted last November 28-29, 2019. The affair was competed by the students from the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Education, College of Engineering, and College of Industrial Technology. It was divided into two categories, the Hardware Implemented Category and the Software Implemented Category where prizes were awarded to the Top 3 in each category.

- Deliveries and Issuances of the Property Management Services is funded by Funds 101, 164, and 151.
- An internally generated income is a proceed created by activities within the Institute.
- The Institute has both internal and external sources of funds.
- Numerous physical facilities developments were funded and initiated by the Institute in 2019 as follows:

 - Conversion of classroom 103 to food packaging area; ○ Construction of a 4-storey Computer Laboratory and Audio-Visual Room (Phases 1 & 2); ○ Rehabilitation of the Food Laboratory (rehabilitation of drainage, canal, faucets, floor tiles, gas leaks, and exhaust);
 - Design and construction of 3-story Multi-Purpose Building connecting CEAFA and EARIST main building; ○ Updated the conceptual master development plan of the Institute; ○ IIPPDO assisted in other physical facilities projects of EARIST.

Enrolment

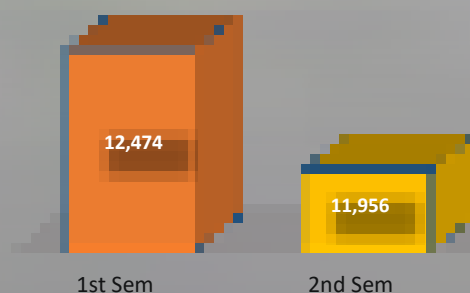
Main Campus

GRADUATE PROGRAM



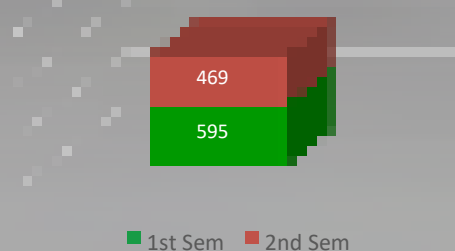
UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM

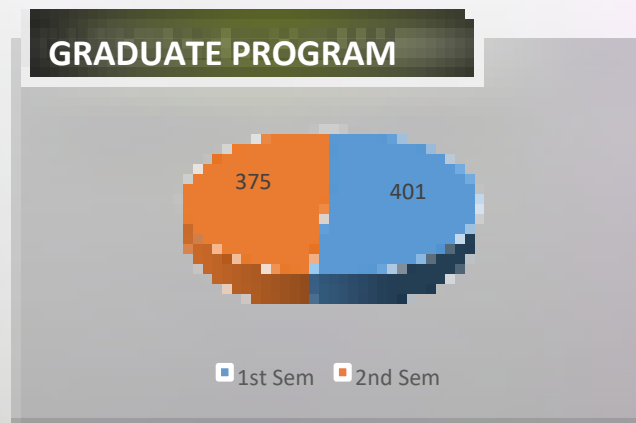

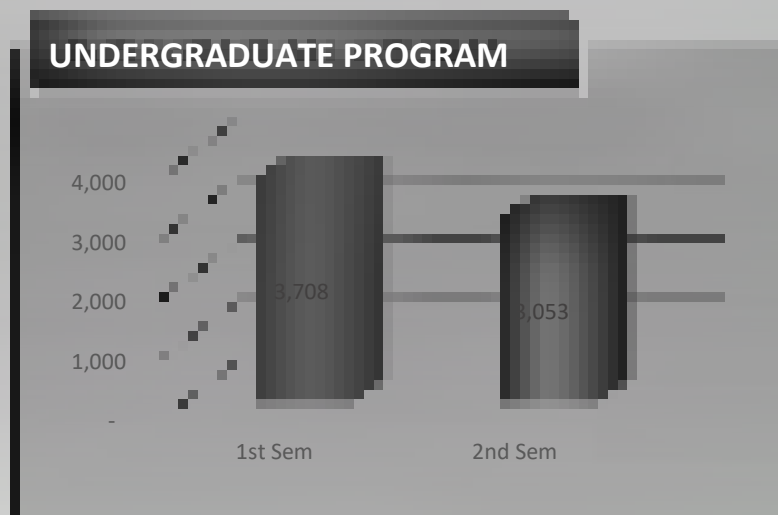


Cavite Campus

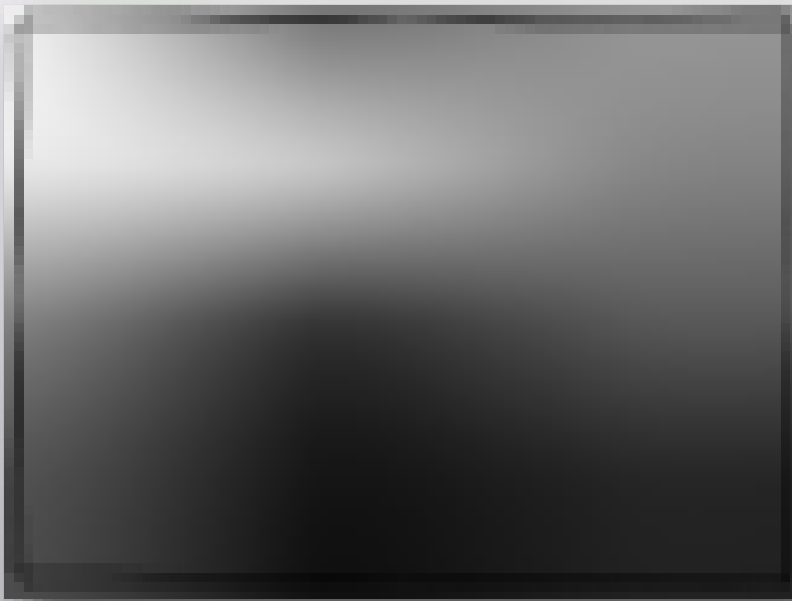

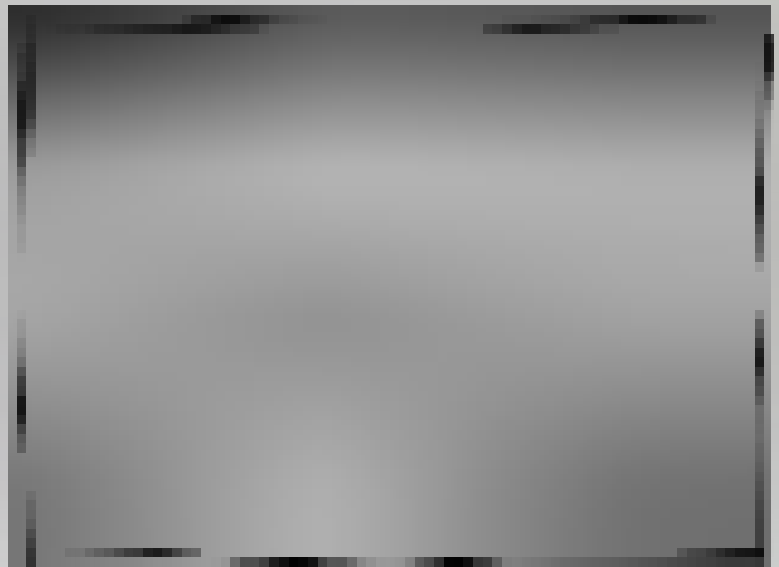


The genial College Governor of CPAC who bested other hopefuls in the Patrolman Qualifying Exam with a rating of 87.64%.

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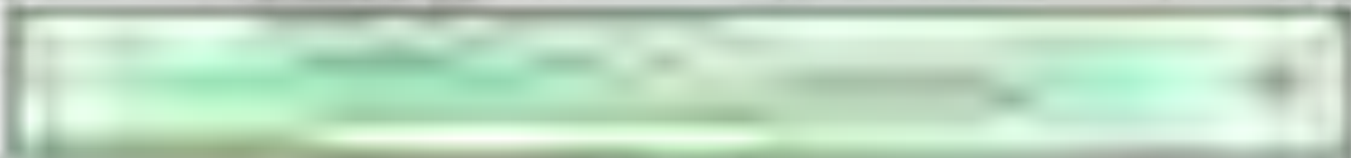

Highlights

AACCUP ACCREDITATION

For this whole week, the Institute was busy once again for the accreditation survey visit of the distinguished and highly certified accreditors of the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines, Inc. (AACCUP) from February 25 to March 1. It was intended to assess scholastic undertakings and pursue self-regulating conclusion to indorse that the programs substantively reached its intentions and commonly at par in excellence to other tertiary institutions.

The accreditors, whose consultant was Dr. Manuel T. Corpus and was headed by Dr. Demetria A. San Juan, were genially and hospitably welcomed by the administration, deans of the colleges under accreditation, and students. A short program was piloted at the Amphitheatre on the 24th of February where these scholarly-minded educators met their local counterparts from the Institution.

Three programs were visited for Level 4, Phase 1 evaluation. BS Industrial Technology in the College of Industrial Technology was visited by the accreditation team headed by its Team Leader, Dr. Esmen M. Cabal. While BS in Hotel and Restaurant Management in the College of Hospitality Management was assessed under the leadership of Dr. Adela J. Ruiz. BS Mathematics in the College of Arts and Sciences was evaluated under the headship of Dr. Isidro L. Duran. Documents were submitted at the Accreditation Room for evaluation where the accreditors were stationed. This was to give ample time and convenience during the evaluation process.



CHED-NCR Monitoring and Evaluation

The Commission on Higher Education – NCR (CHED-NCR) visited the Institute to conduct a monitoring and evaluation designed for Higher Education Institutions. This said duty call of Education Supervisors was spearheaded by Dr. Bellaflor M. Coronado together with Dr. Jessie O. Abril and Ms. Marife P. Flores. They were received at the Conference Room on January 29 where they authenticated the school's compliance with CHED Minimum Standards on the areas of: 1) Institutional quality and standards on programs, instruction, research, and extension; 2) Tuition and other school fees; 3) Assessment of student affairs and services per CMO No. 9 s. 2013 and CMO 21 s. 2006; 4) Student financial assistance and loan programs; 5) Foreign students; and 6) Implementation of the NSTP Law.

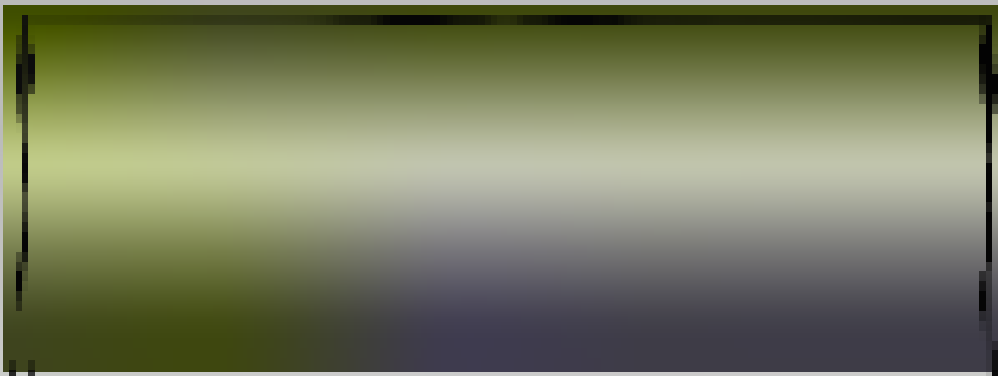

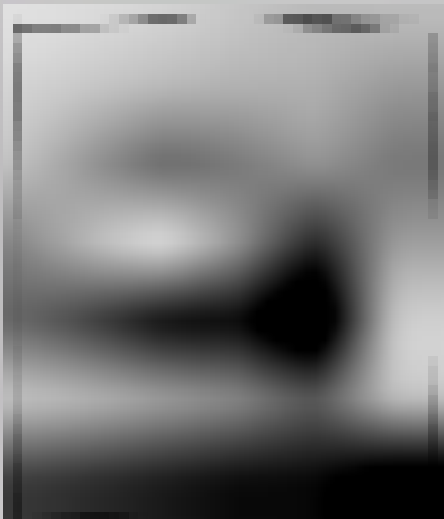


FACULTY AWARDS AND RECOGNITIONS

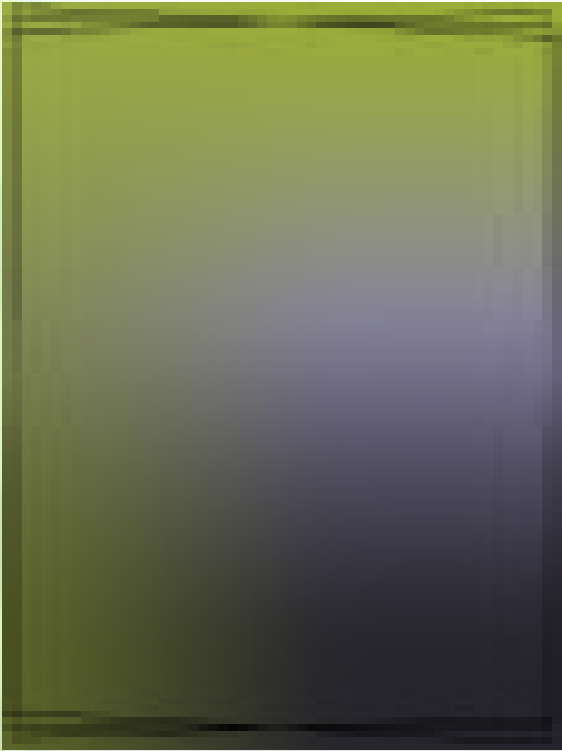

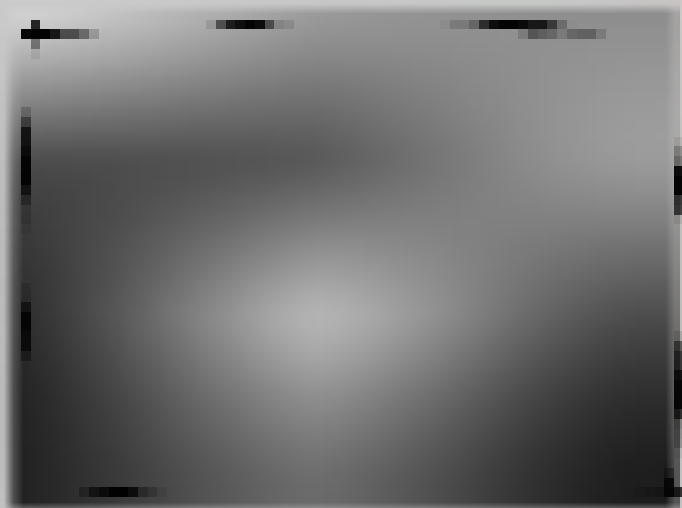
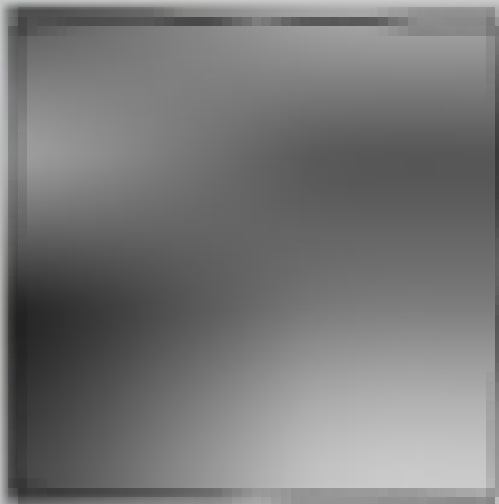
ACTIVITIES DURING INTERSESSION TERM

Such step of academically preparing a competitive syllabi was a very timely signal to properly equip his fellow educators in their quest for scholastic excellence.

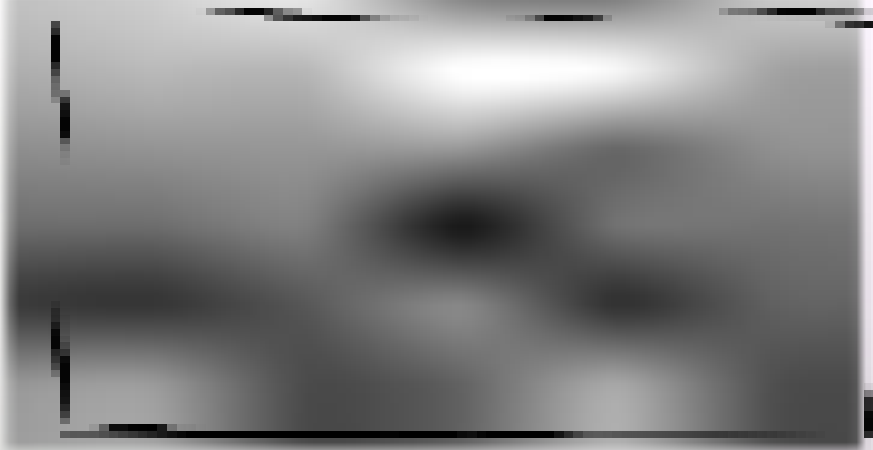

SPORTS DEVELOPMENT

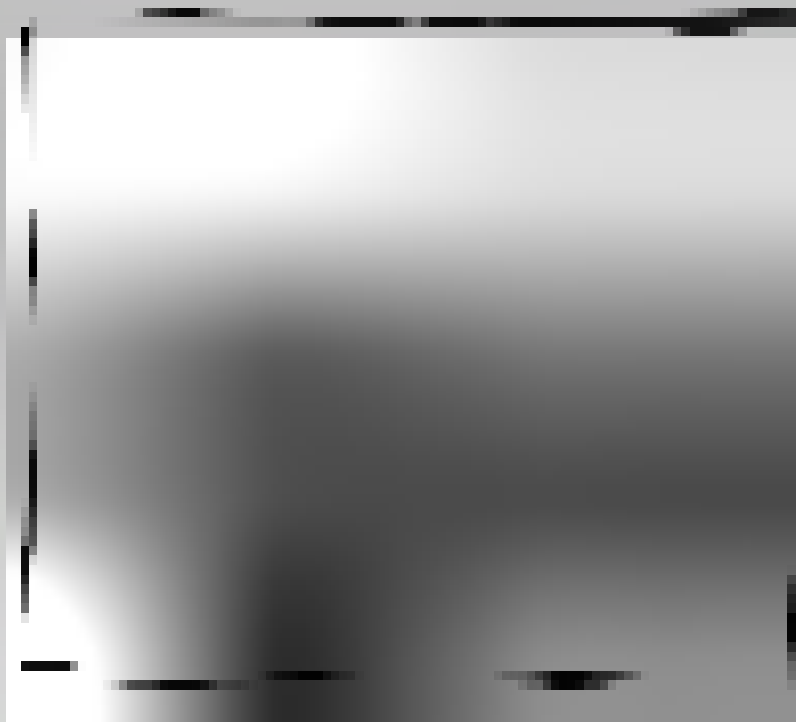
To boost students' morale in the field of sports, the Institute endorsed its students to compete in various sports competitions and discipline giving honor and prestige to the school.

6th Geraldine Darwin's Dance Challenge 2019

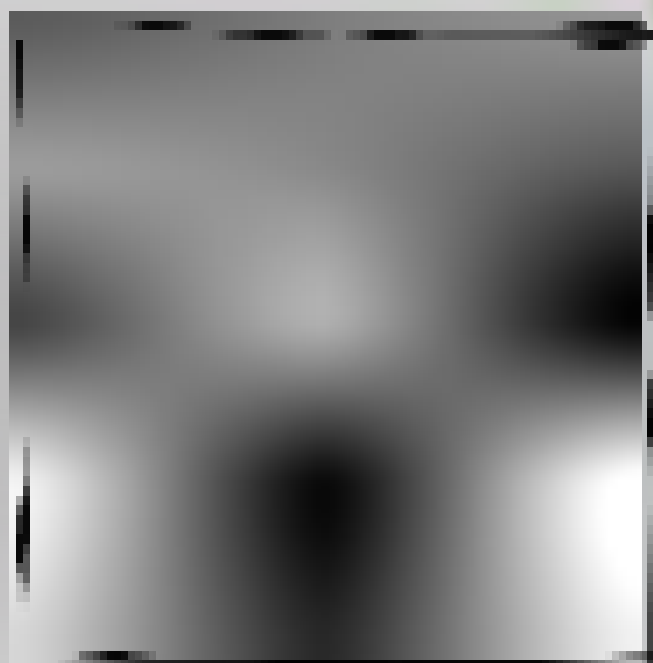
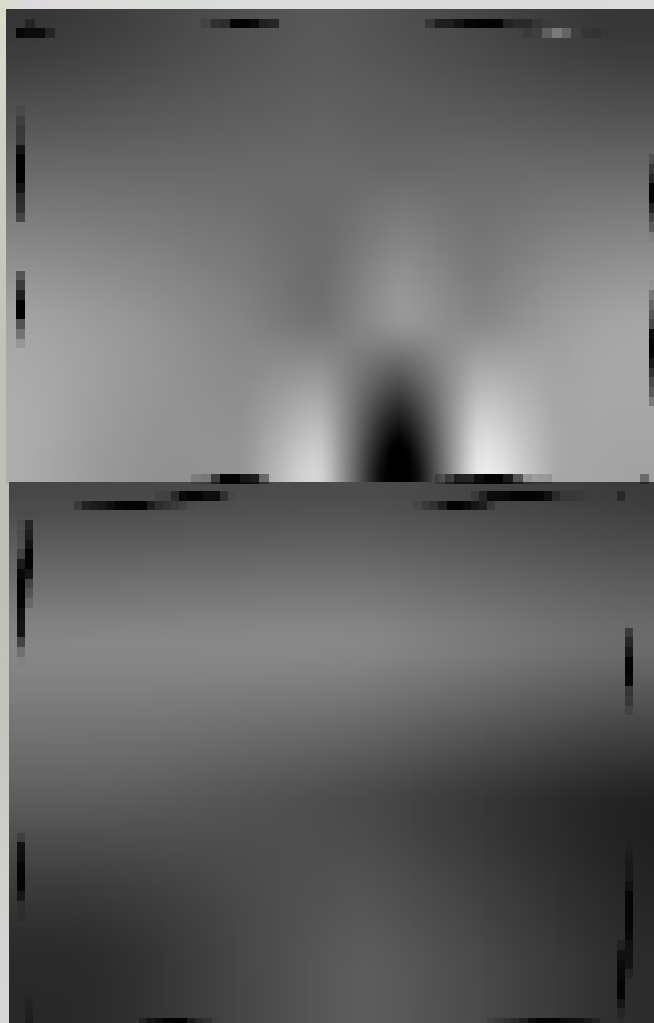

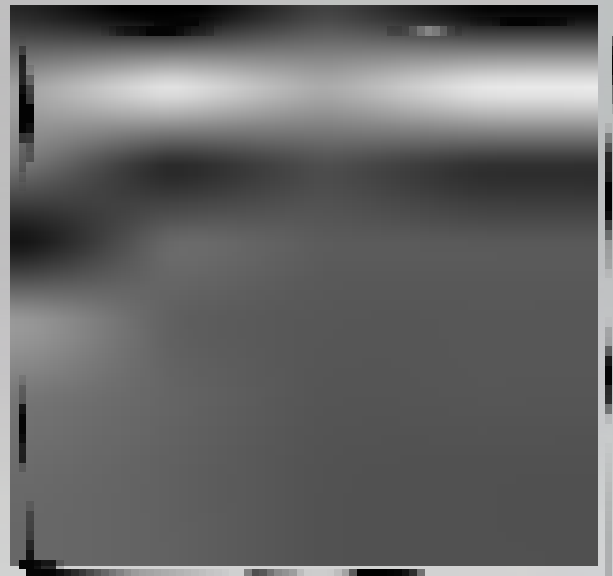
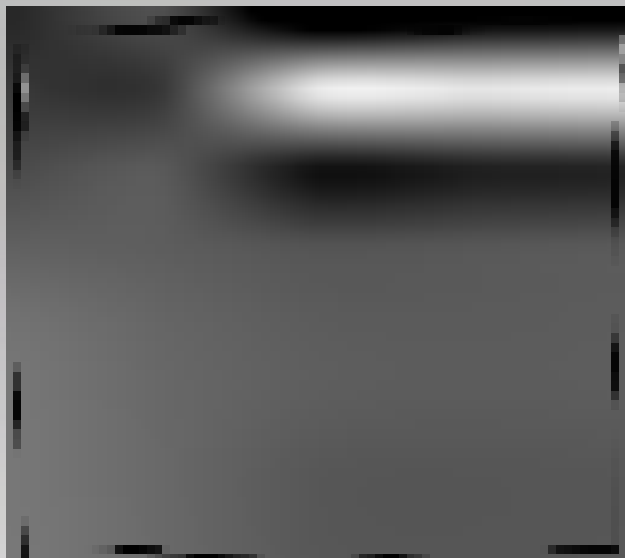
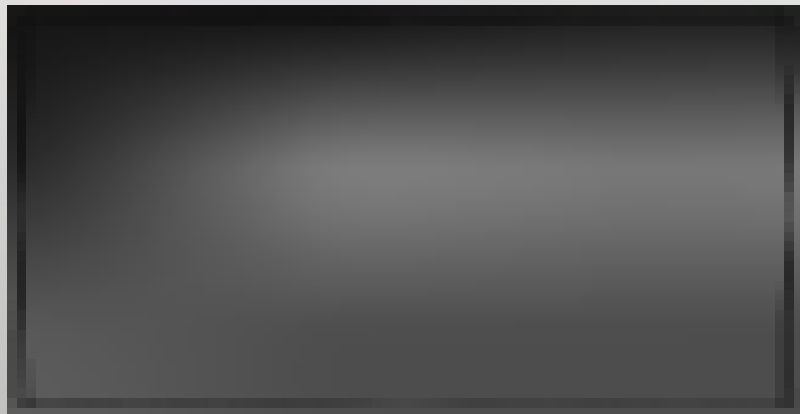


2019 Philippines Athletics Championships – National Open

12th RESEARCH COLLOQUIUM

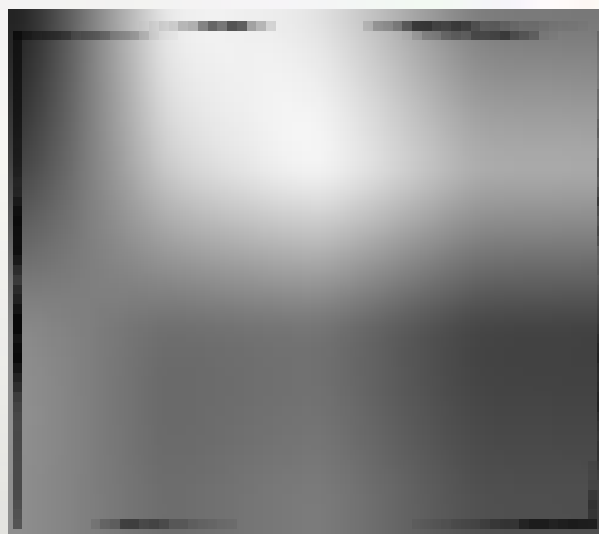
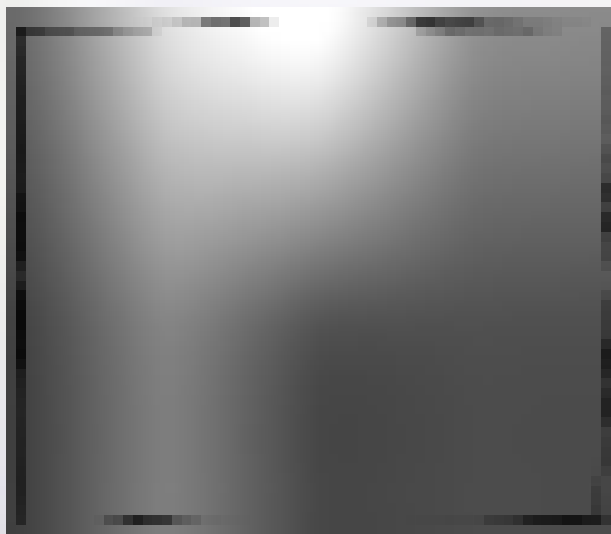

2019 REGIONAL INVENTION CONTEST AND EXHIBIT – NATIONAL CAPITAL REGION (RIGNCR)

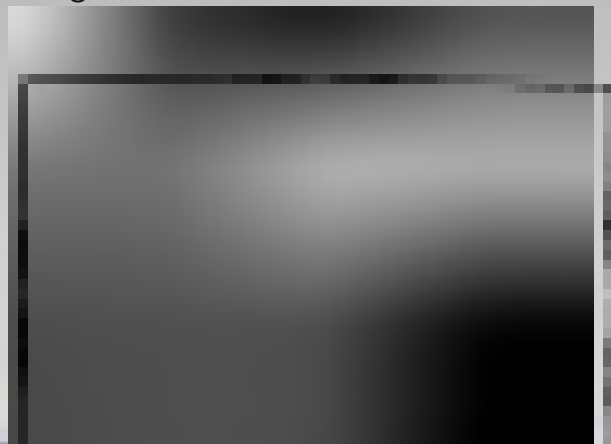
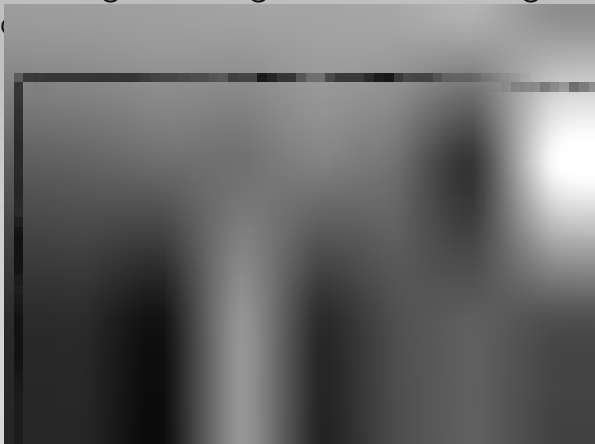

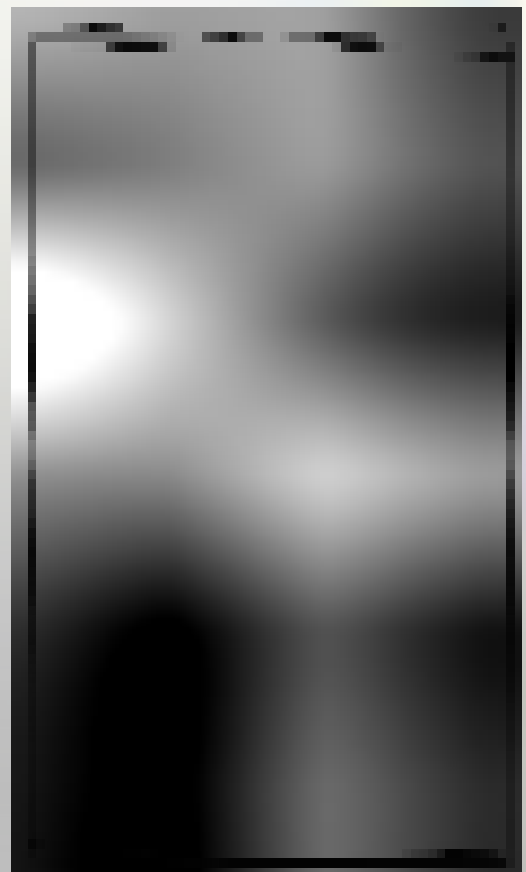
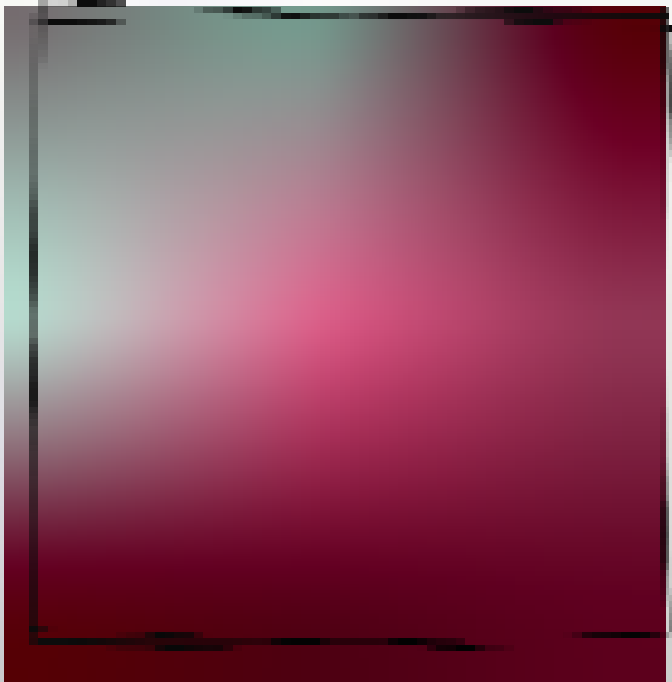
2019 INTERNATIONAL HIGHER EDUCATION RESEARCH FORUM

Promotion

A promotion is a movement from one position to another with an increase in duties and responsibilities as authorized by law and usually accompanied by an increase in pay. The movement may be from one department or agency to another or from one organizational unit to another in the same department or agency. (Executive Order No. 292 [BOOK V/Title I/Subtitle A/Chapter 5-Personnel Policies and Standards]).

Using the National Budget Circular 461 Faculty Evaluation Final Print Out (5th Cycle 2007 – 2010) as basis of promotion in the academe, the Institute has implemented promotion of those in the teaching positions. As of 2019, fifty two (52) faculty members were promoted. Instructor I and Instructor II faculty members vastly experienced the said promotion to higher positions.

Reclassification

The Department of Budget and Management, on its Budget Circular 2018 – 3 dated July 30, 2018, defined reclassification as a form of staffing modification or position classification action which is applied only when there is warranted substantial change in the regular duties of the incumbent of the position.

With this, the Institute implemented the reclassification of forty seven (47) faculty members also using the Faculty Final Print Out (5th Cycle 2007 – 2010) of NBC 461.

The project was completed on February 20, 2019 by the contractor; “Thaumaturgy Trade Phils.” and was turned over to the Administrative Services as end-user.

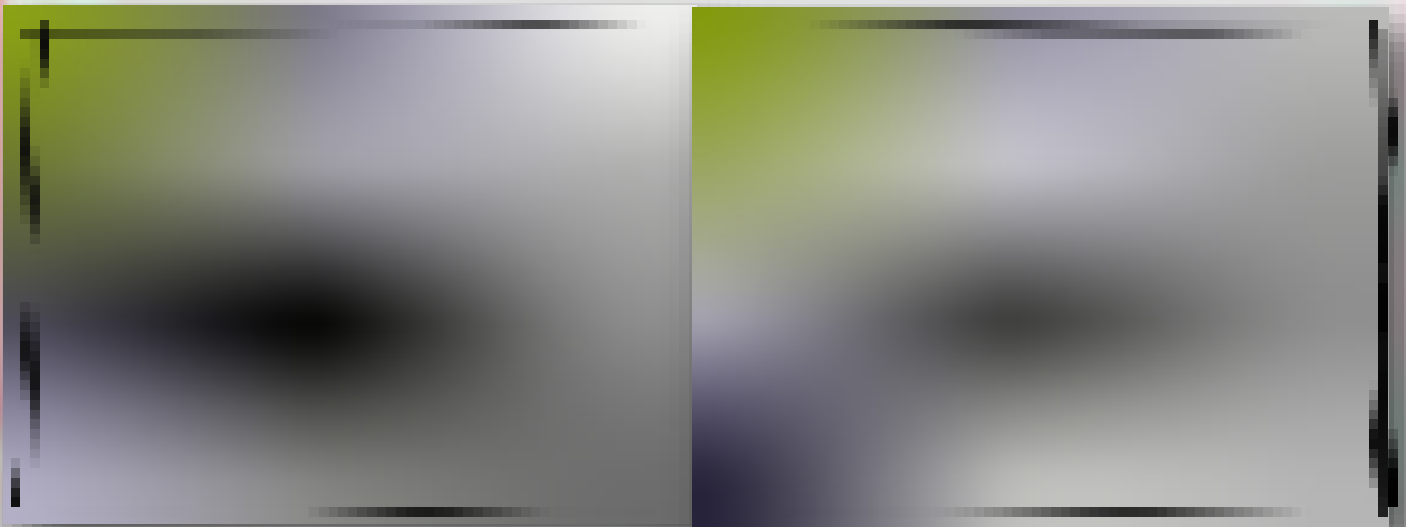
Application of Green Technology of EARIST Buildings

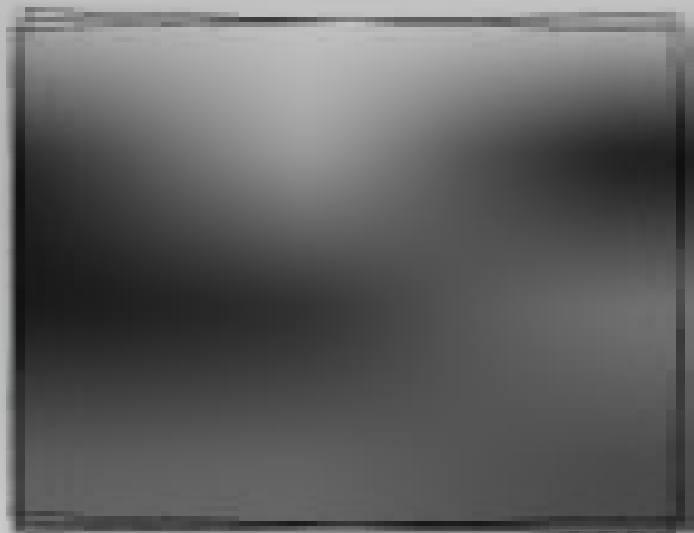
Donation of Fire and Rescue Unit

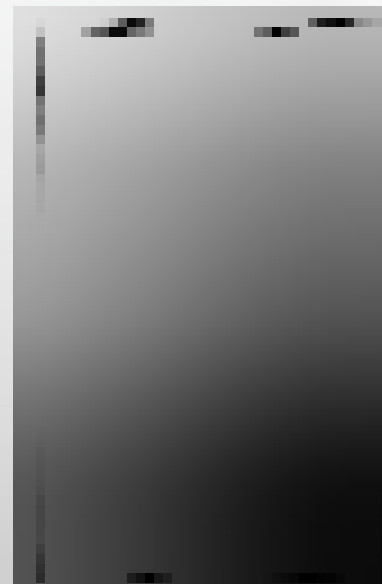

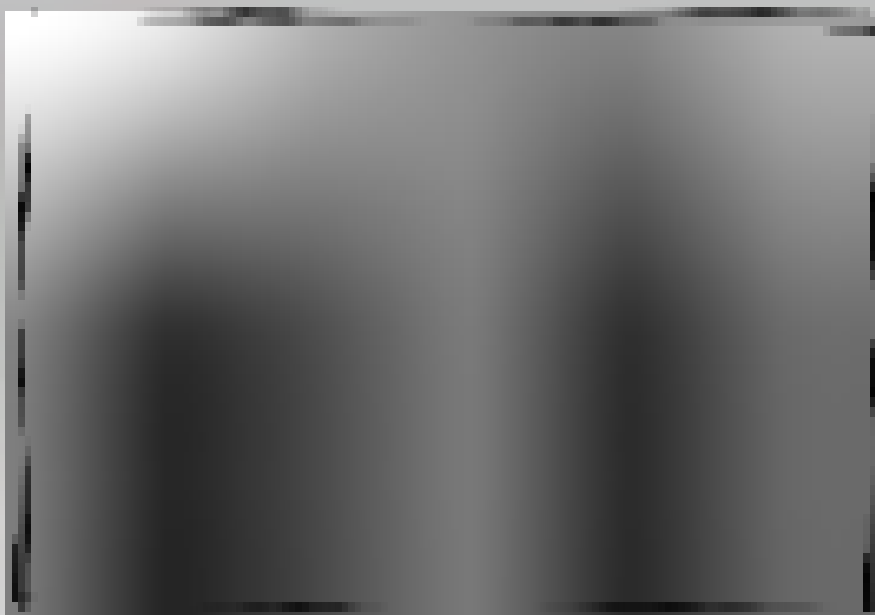
2019 FREEDOM OF INFORMATION (FOI) AWARDS

The 2019 Freedom of Information State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) trophy awarded to EARIST on the 12th of December 2019.



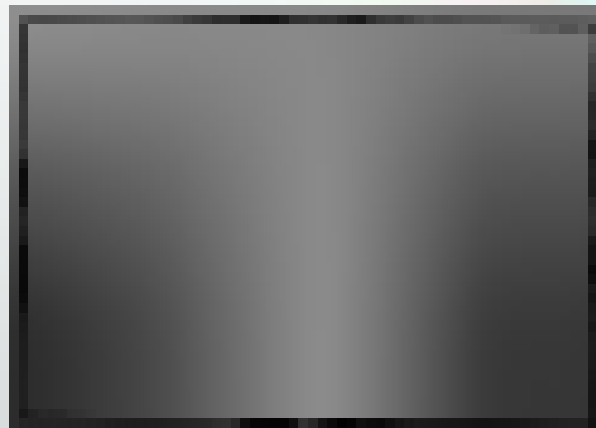

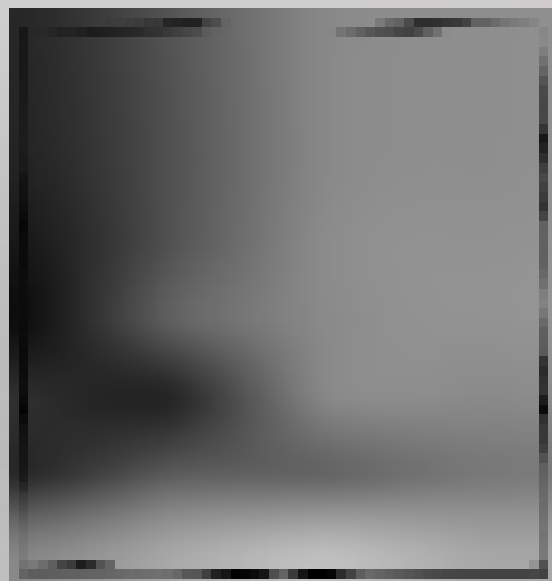
TESTIMONIAL AND RECOGNITION PROGRAM FOR RETIREEES, FACULTY AND EMPLOYEES

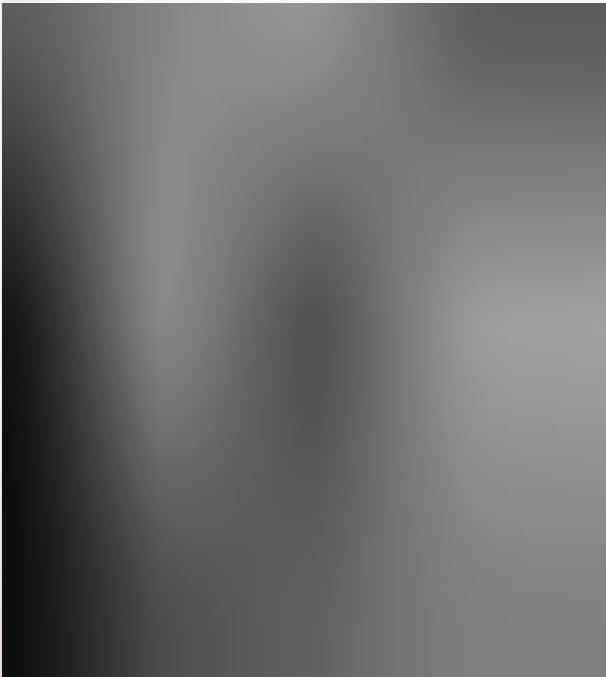

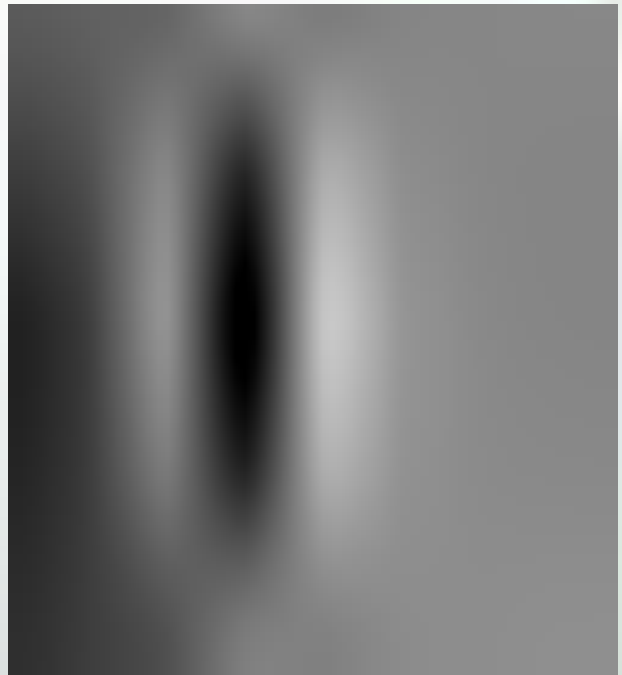

VALUES ORIENTATION WORKSHOP FOR ACADEMIC AND NON-ACADEMIC PERSONNEL

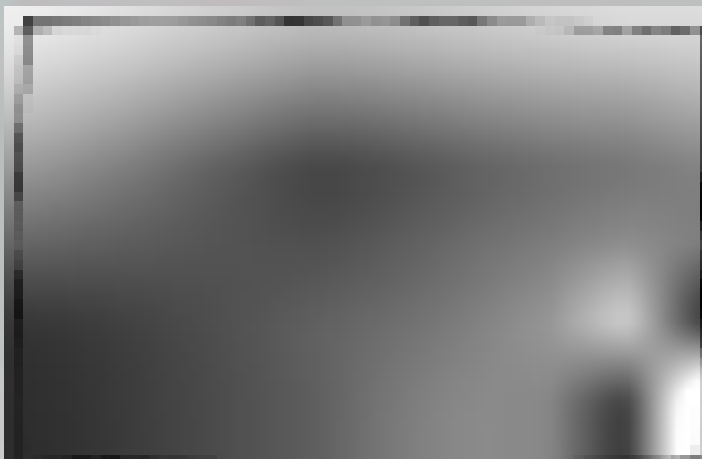

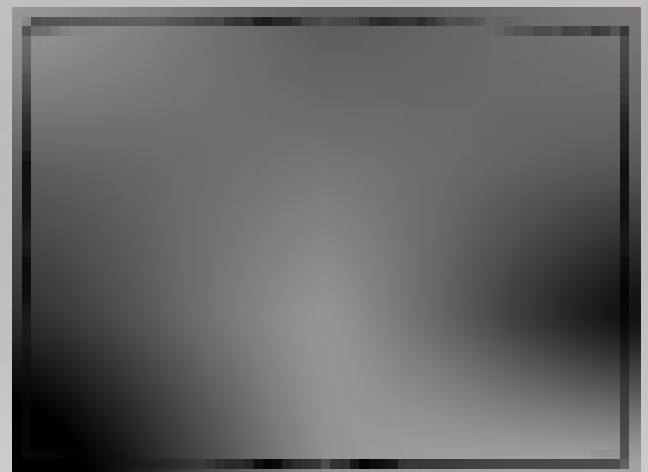

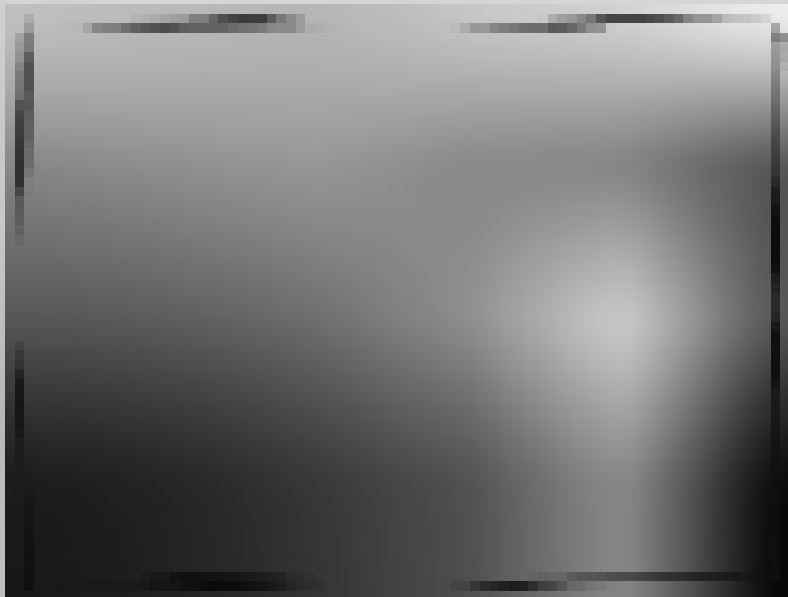

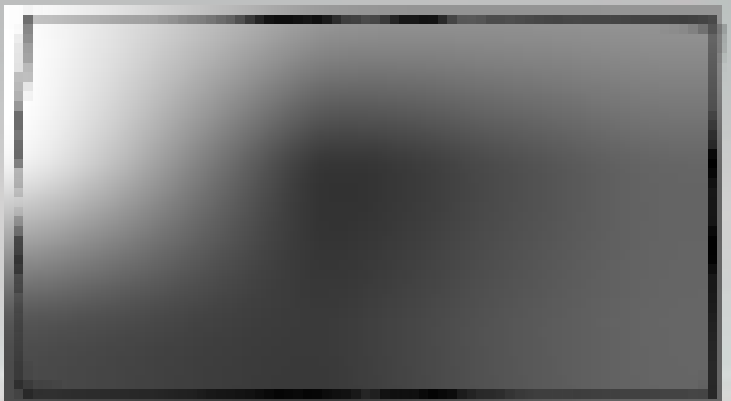

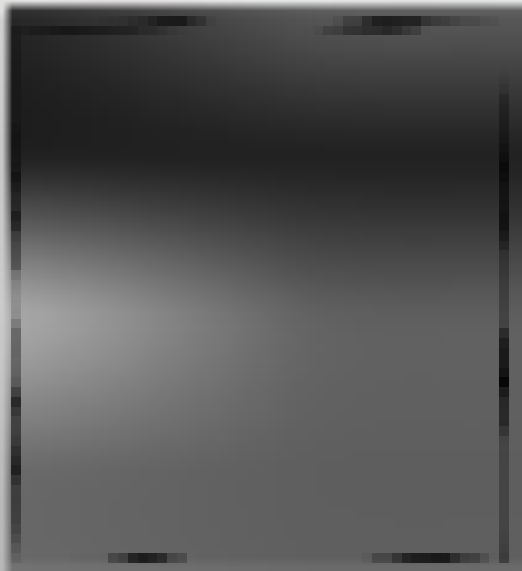

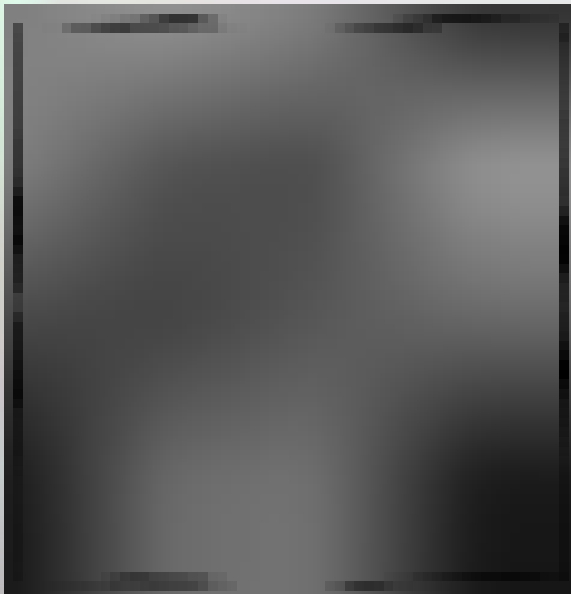
Employers, like the administration of the Institute, are obliged to deliver a safe working environment for employees and that concern means having a disaster plan for responding certainly to natural disasters. Readiness, through understanding of evacuation plans or drilling for regionally specific scenarios, is the key to keeping your workforce out of harm's way.

Participants were oriented first on the possible causes and after-effects of fire in the lives and properties of every individual with the following objectives: identify dangers associated with fire and other emergencies; recall requirements for emergency action and fire prevention plans; recognize housekeeping guidelines for fire prevention; recall the importance of emergency exits and identify their components; recognize actions to take in response to emergency alarms. Then, they were set on hands-on activities on how to douse a dangerous fire.

BLOOD LETTING PROGRAM

The Blood-Letting was again initiated by the Institute as headed by the EARIST Disaster Risk Reduction Management and the Administration under Dr. Giovanni L. Ahunin sponsored by the National Kidney Transplant Institute in cooperation with the Department of Health, Philippine Blood Center. 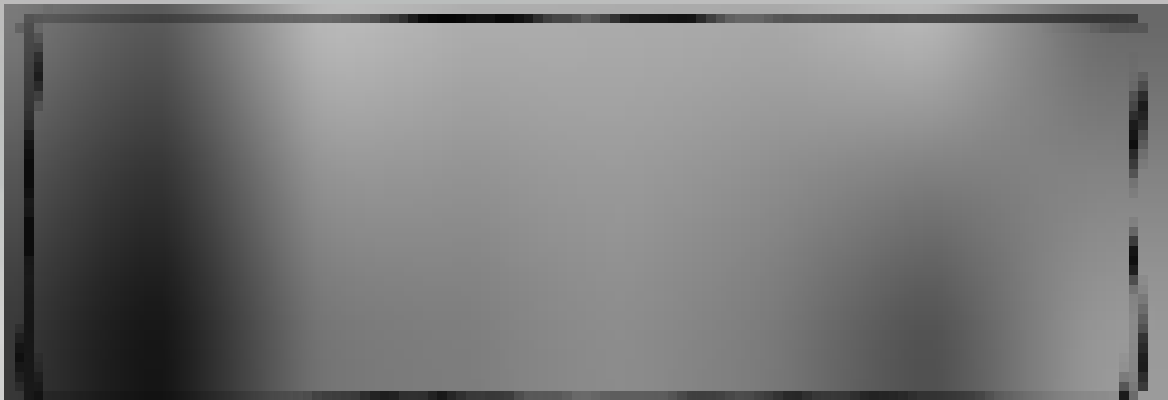
In this activity, EARIST employees and students were encouraged to donate the lifeblood which could possibly save others' lives.

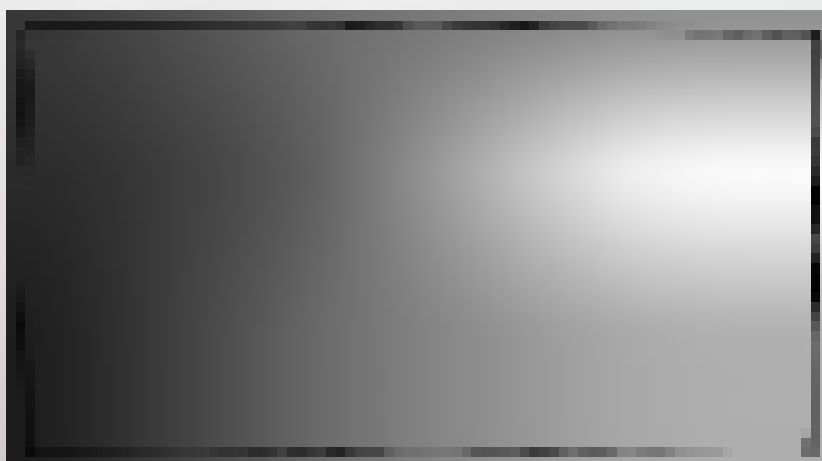

DRUG AWARENESS SEMINAR

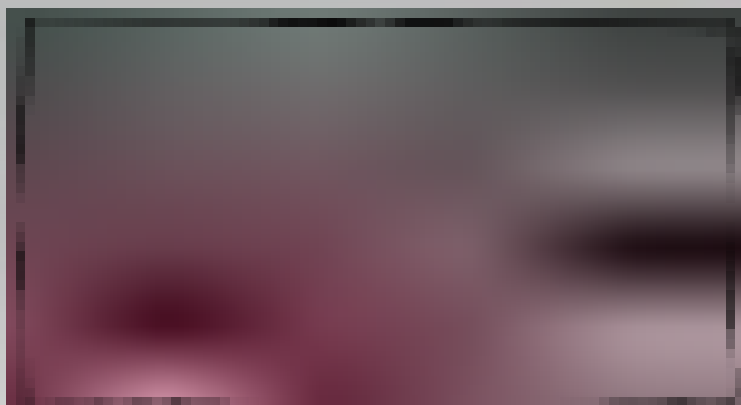
To raise awareness on the adverse effects of drug abuse and the salient features of Republic Act 9165 or the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act of 2001, EARIST through the Administration and Medical and Dental Services conducted a seminar on Drug Awareness themed as “Adiktus ka ba? If Not, Join Ka! If Yes, Alam na this” on October 10, 2019 at the EARIST Amphi-theater.

A Police Officer was invited as the Resource Speaker who distinguished the difference between prohibited drugs and illegal drugs. For this reason, it was necessary for these organizations to safeguard, prevent, inform, treat and physical, mental and social rehabilitation of drug addicts and for supporting their families, the ones most affected by drug problems. He further stressed the importance to have a dialogue and to monitor the youth.

The program was in compliance with the Dangerous Drugs Board Regulation No. 2 series of 2004 and CSC Memo on the mandatory random drug test for public officials and employees.

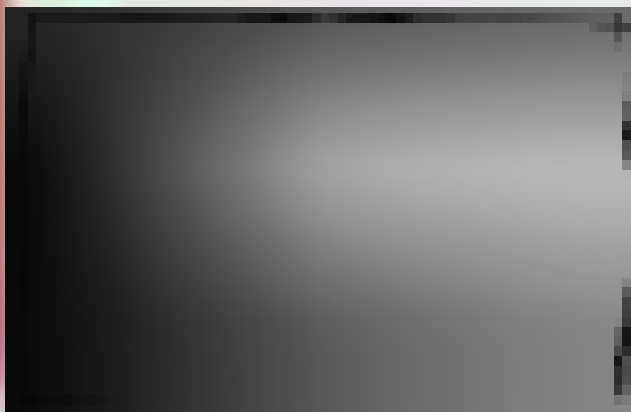

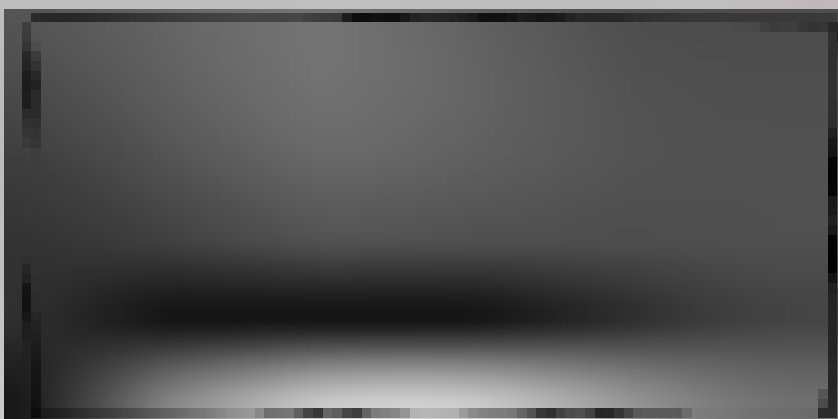
SEMINAR WORKSHOP ON EASE OF DOING BUSINESS

STRATEGIC PLANNING WORKSHOP

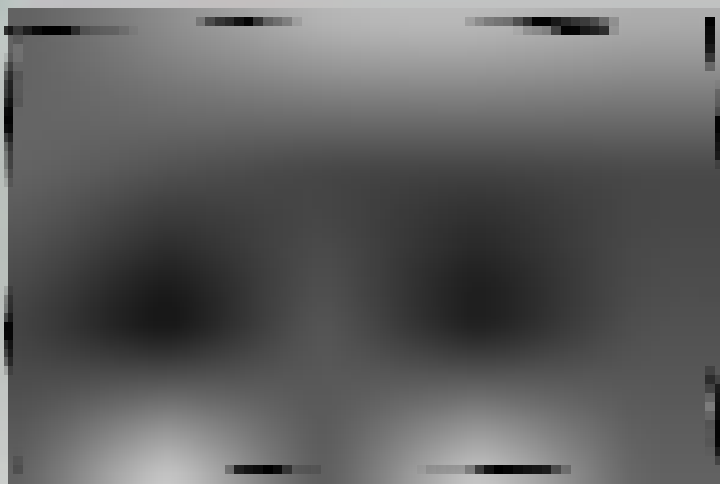

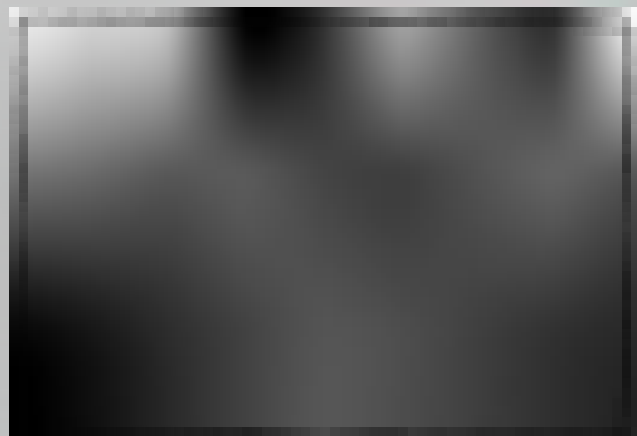

EARIST CAVITE CAMPUS TEAM BUILDING ACTIVITY

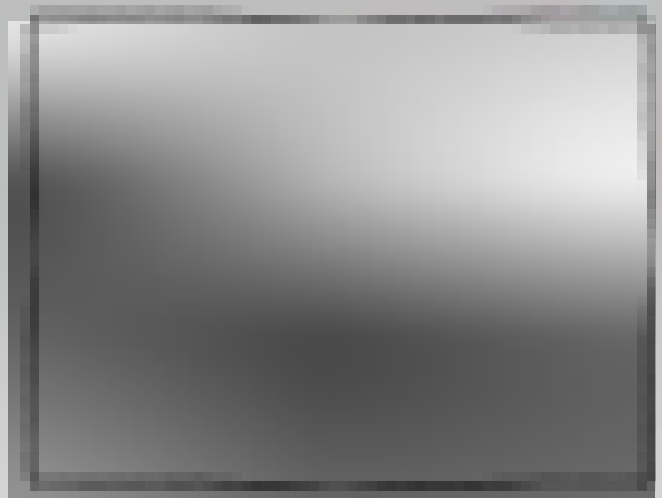
Educating fellow working people on health and physical fitness are undoubtedly essential. It could create a tangible impact on their lives as individuals and as a member of the working community as well.

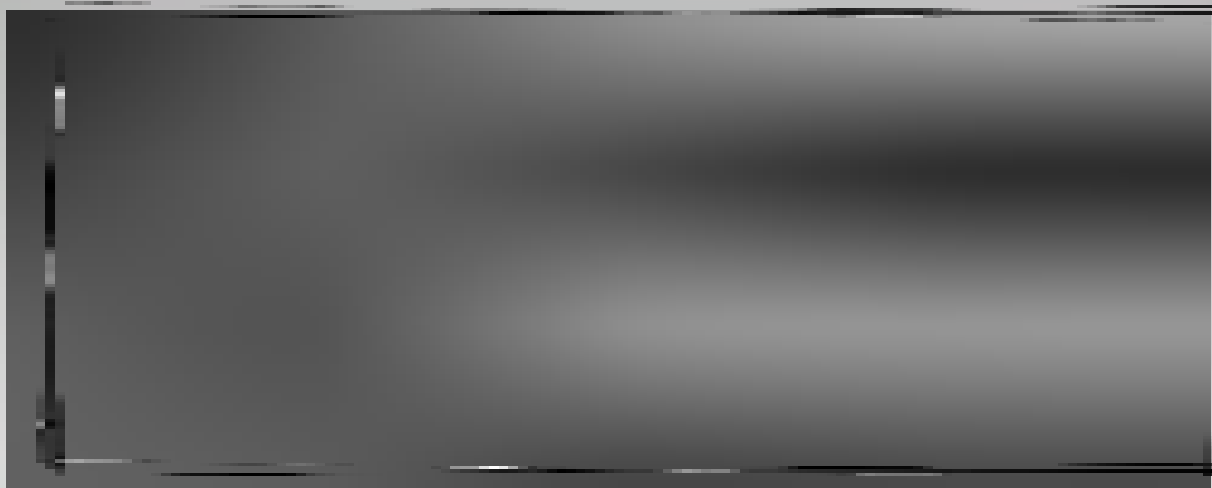

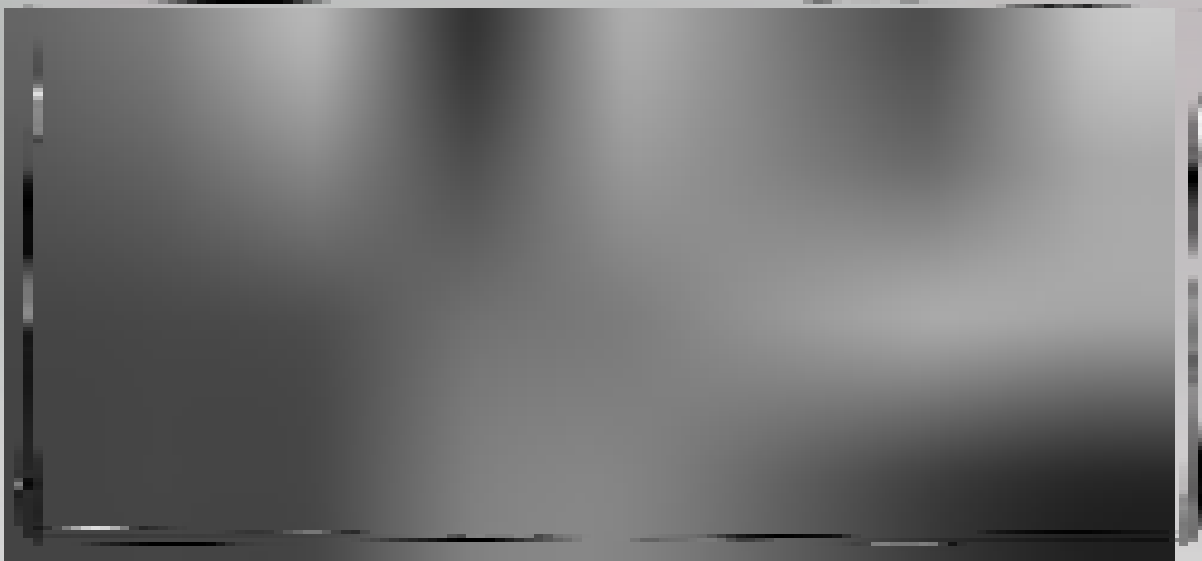
INAUGURATION OF THE ALUMNI DORM AND INTER-FAITH CENTER

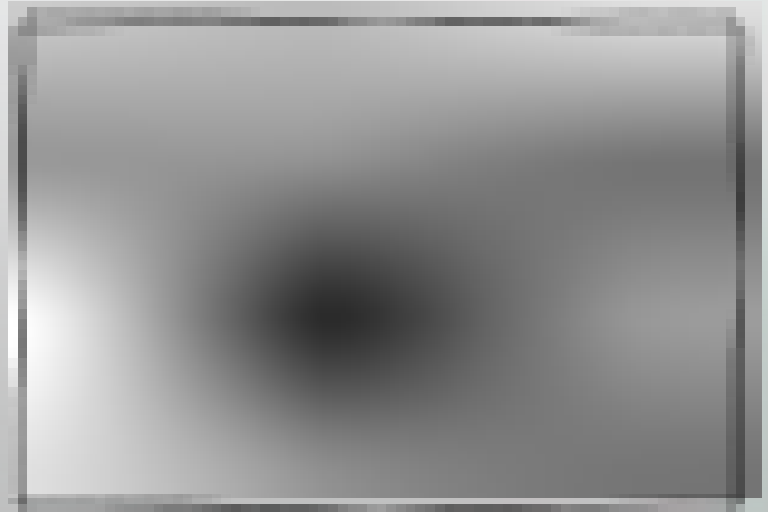
MANDATORY RANDOM DRUG TESTING FOR OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES

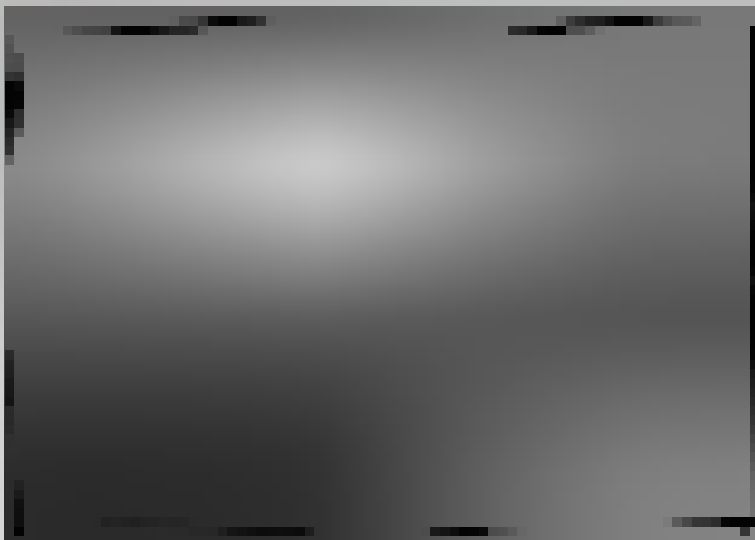

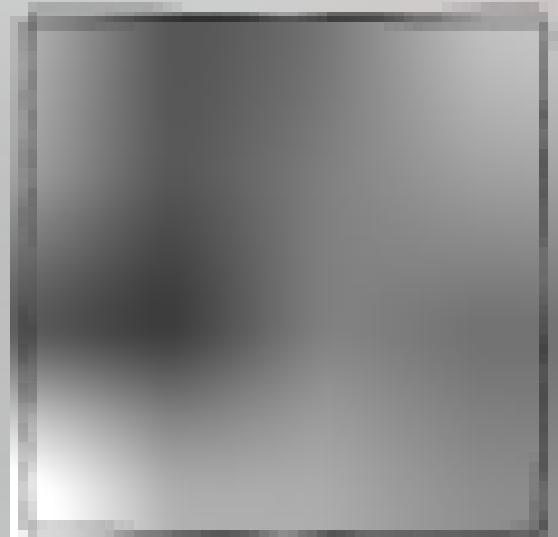
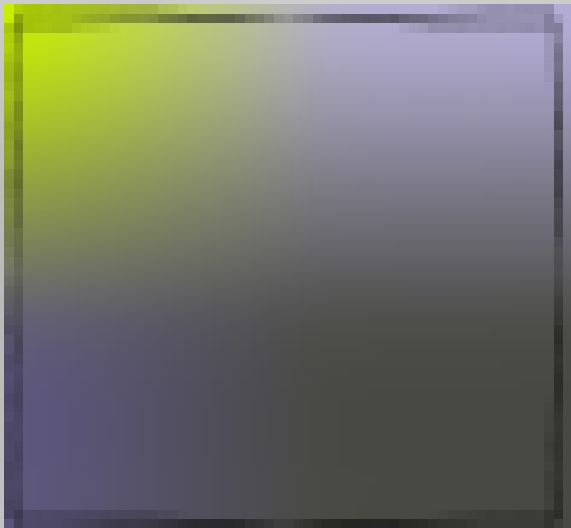


ANNUAL FLU VACCINE

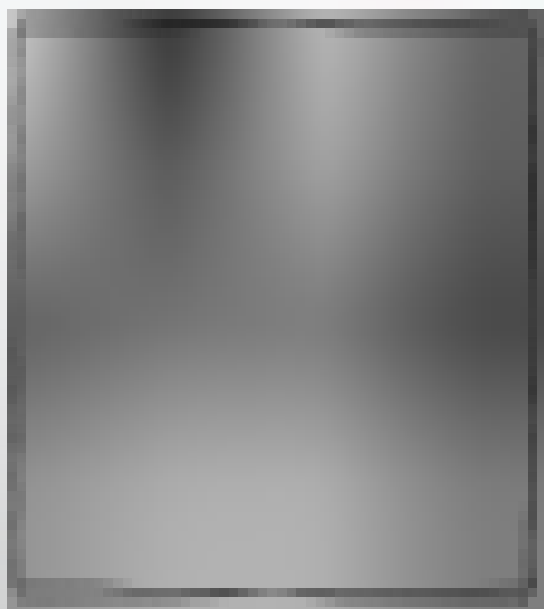
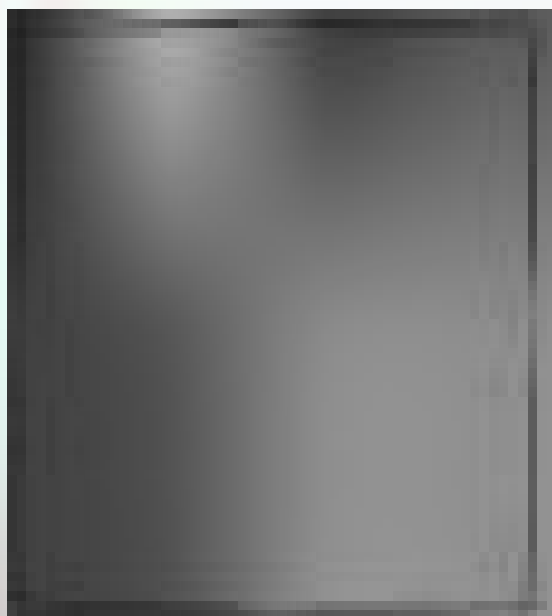
This flu vaccine was funded by the Administration which benefitted all employees, national and city plantilla item holders, casual/temporary, and job order.



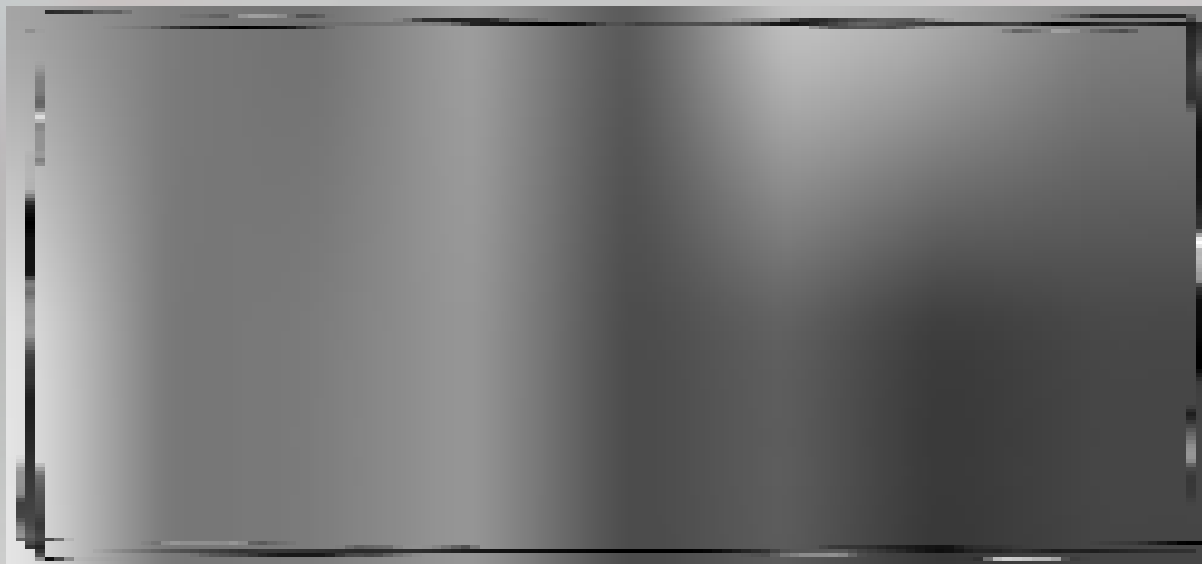
